"Faithful and true-hearted," family, kindness, spirit, fun - only some of the words to describe the gentlemen to be honored at the 2006 Wall of Fame. In its 69-year history, **SGHS** has been blessed with the extraordinary dedication of women and men imbued with the vision and determination to carry forth its mission. When alumni return to give of their time and talent - the circle is complete.



Mention **Jerry Ritt** and perhaps what comes to mind first is the '59 Parish League Championship. The glory days of Greyhound basketball live on, evidenced by the turnout at last year's Wall of Fame. A graduate of both the elementary and high school, Jerry returned with his buddy Mike Manning, to coach the grade school teams, intramurals and tournaments. Inspired by his hero, Bernie Socha, Jerry continued his commitment to the students as AD for the Catholic Order of Foresters. Partnering **SGHS** with Margate Park, he was able to organize statewide spelling bees, bowling tournaments and the two All-Star teams that played at the Chicago Stadium during Bulls half time. Thanks to Jerry, famed announcer Jack Brickhouse interviewed both teams creating a lifetime memory! There was a Ritt at **SGHS** from 1946 -1988 and Edward, Jerry's Dad, was custodian for 40 years, motivating all the students regardless of their last names, to make good choices! Jerry continued his career of service first as a teacher then as a supervisor for the park district and later the IBEW. He is currently court manager for the Cook County Clerk of the Circuit Court.

Tom Bearden arrived at **SGHS** in 1965. Hired over the phone, he was greeted on his first day by Sr. Gilbert who thought he was a student and demanded to know why he was using the elevator! Except for a few years at Josephinum, Tom's entire career was dedicated to the students of St. Greg's. Curious and involved, his classes were challenging and fun. He'd be the first up a ladder to decorate for prom, but very little got by him when it came to building floats. Over the years, **SGHS** was family: Betty McCormick, office manager, moon-lighted as baby-sitter. Kathy, Tom's wife, came on staff to teach drama. St. Patrick's Day found Tom cooking corned beef for the faculty. On Fridays, in his famous sandals, he'd organize decompression game-time for teachers. In 1986, Tom became principal. He was also the first president of St. Gregory. There were many changes over his 39 years: the Learning Resource Program was initiated, technology exploded, the science lab opened, Coach Socha, Ann Dapkus, George Hacker and the Sisters retired, the Bears won, the Bulls won, under Coach Gattuso, the Greyhounds won and . . . Tom Bearden rode west into the sunset.



Tom Bearden and Jerry Ritt are St. Gregory! Between them they cover nearly 60 years of history. **Fr. John Clemens, Sr. Mary Cornille '53, Michael Manning '61 and Delia Ramirez '01** will be presenters at the ceremony which begins at 6:00 PM. After church, there will be dining and imbibing and lively entertainment in the gym. To make the occasion a successful FUNdraiser, there will be a silent auction/raffle, a cash raffle and several rounds of Split the Pot run by the peerless Fraser sisters. By popular demand, **Ken Lydecker '67** has again graciously volunteered to emcee.

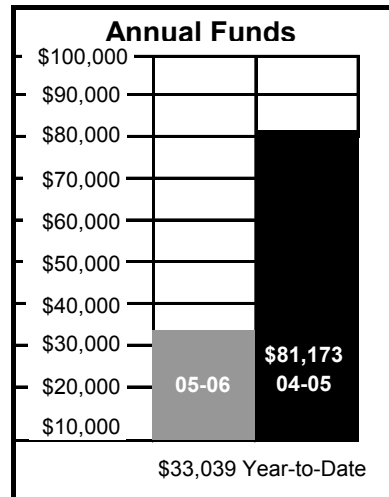

What Exactly is "Development"?

Do you feel that the frequency of our asking has accelerated over the past few years? Development outreach, especially in a school as small as St. Gregory, is vital to keeping the doors open. Tuition does not nearly cover the cost of a student's education. Tuition currently is \$6,050, while the actual cost per student is closer to \$9,800. While roughly 55% of our students receive some amount of assistance, essentially every student receives financial aid. Last year through the efforts of many, more than \$100,000 was made available for students in need. That said, building maintenance, electrical upgrade and technology expansion along with a living wage for faculty/staff, tip the scales and make development an increasing priority. Yes, our pace has accelerated and yes, we have the history, faith, mission and energy to move it forward.

To fill in the gap, our Development Team has grown to include, along with the president and the business manager, the Protégé Program director, the athletic director, a corporate/foundation grants manager, a public relations/ alumni/events coordinator and a recruiting/admissions director. Together we work to find support, seek the guardian angel and in general raise the visibility of the school in the community and city. We do this through Timbers, the Annual Appeal, alumni and community events such as the Wall of Fame, the Mercury Theater, Andrew's Walk, the golf outing and through proposals written to foundations and corporations. To survive as a small school, we also turn to you, our loyal alumni, to expand our vision and to think outside the box. Last year's Annual Fund raised \$81,173. **We need your help to meet and exceed that goal.**



St. Gregory wrapped up 2005 with some notable successes that we'd like to share:

- An operating grant of \$20,000 from the W.B. & H.P. White Foundation
- A financial aid grant of \$25,000 from the Helen Brach Foundation
- A \$20,000 challenge grant from Big Shoulders was met to achieve the \$40,000 goal
- Tuition assistance grant of \$10,000 from the Dr. Scholl Foundation
- ALUMNI ROCK! Wall of Fame, Golf Outing and the Manning Bowl = \$19,000!
- Gym shoes for the basketball teams from an anonymous donor
- Three paid-in-full trips for students to Spain/Italy during Easter break Anonymus!
- St. Gregory featured substantially and frequently in the press, television and radio

Brenda VanVlierberghe Engel, Andrew's mother, a student herself during the 1970's, has been cafeteria manager at St. Greg's for many years.

"SGHS HAS A LOT TO TEACH OTHER SCHOOLS . . ."

I cannot tell you how pleased I was to know that your graduate, **Andrea Raila '78**, was able to get me a gig in her old high school and allow me to speak to your students. I was so touched, eyes filling, throat dry, to see your students filing in, with such quietness and order, all looking so smart in their uniforms. To look at a desegregated, truly desegregated group of students was a sight I will never forget. It was like looking at the people of the whole world, with every skin tone known to man. It was like a human checkerboard, a thrilling sight to see.

I have been in small colleges all over this country, and at lunchtime in a desegregated school, the students sit with people of their own color. I asked your students if that was what happened in their lunchroom and they laughed at me saying, "we are desegregated. We love each other. We do not see color." Can you imagine? How I wish it were the truth at every school. What a wonderful, rich experience to see colleagues of different cultures than your own, and to be able to live with the differences every school day. . . . What a terrible thing to yank your child out of a public school, home teach them and then send them to a segregated high school. How can we have peace, with such a situation? How can they learn to love each other when they are pulled away from each other, as if it were a privilege to live with people that are all alike?



I think St. Greg's has a lot to teach other schools on how to live in this troubled world. Thank you for inviting me. Hugs to all of you.
Granny D

Born in 1910 in New Hampshire, Doris "Granny D" Haddock, has led a life of hard work and distinction. A grandmother of 16, she is recently famous for her walk across America at age 90 for Campaign for Finance Reform and the passage of the bill, a great victory against long odds, sponsored by Senators McCain and Feingold. With her husband, she helped stop the planned use of hydrogen bombs in Alaska. Under the tutelage of her son, she trained for more than a year to go on her 3000-mile walk across America. Ultimately 2,200 supporters joined her on the final leg of her journey up the steps of the capital in Washington, DC. In 2003, she completed a 22,000 mile "Get Out the Vote" drive targeted to working women, and in 2004, she ran for New Hampshire's senate seat You can read her story in her book [Granny D: You're Never Too Old to Raise a Little Hell](#).

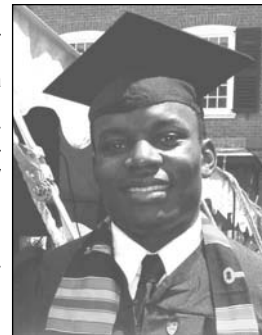

On October 8 Sr. Annamarie Cook was involved in a car accident returning home from the Class of '55 reunion. She sustained multiple injuries and underwent surgery for a broken hip. A week later she died from complications. Alumni remembered her fondly:

Mary Strauel Stuermer '53: "Sr. Annamarie Cook always had the gentlest smile, as if she knew something you didn't know yet! She seemed to listen to whoever was speaking to her, as if there were only two people in the room. She had an uncanny ability to remember faces and names. Sister was such a gentle soul; I cannot imagine her speaking badly about or to anyone. She was a humble, loving woman, the rarest of teachers who made you realize that she truly loved what she was doing. A woman of great faith, she had a vision of the future and followed her heart and soul by founding the Sisters of the Living Word. She possessed a warmth and generous spirit rarely witnessed in today's world. She touched so many in her lifetime. As a former student, I don't believe that I will ever forget her; she has earned her place in the arms of the Lord, for all eternity."

Joann Schmidt Navratil '53: "What a great teacher she was! The sisters were always up on the latest trends in teaching. They taught English the way it was taught in college, by reading and discussing rather than just stressing grammar and rules."

Jean Winandy Evinger '53: "Sr. Annamarie was the glue that held me together several times in high school. She was an example to everyone, in word and in deed. She was kind to all, even the most obnoxious among us. When I think of her, I always think of Wind, Sand and Stars, which was required reading in her English class my junior year. She brought a new dimension to the study of English, which was a real innovation at that time and which led me into the same field in college. Over the years, I kept in touch with Sister, and I was aware of her 'rising within the ranks' of the SCCs. She was truly a renaissance lady, a fearless leader with foresight beyond the rest of us. Her kind comes around very seldom, and I do believe that when God created her, He threw away the mold."

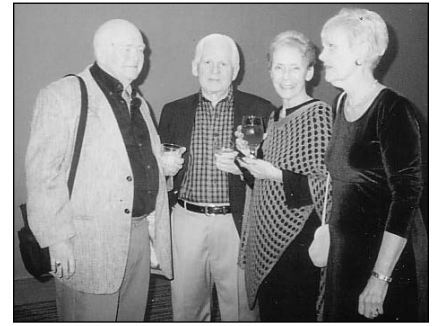
