John Stark '71 called the Alumni Office five years ago volunteering to organize a golf benefit in support of students in need of financial assistance. Who could have predicted not only the popularity of the game but the doors it would open to increased alumni involvement? John knew his way around a golf course and how to sell just about anything! He had remained involved with many schoolmates from the old neighborhood. Alumni directory in hand, he began a circle of outreach that crossed generations. Coming from a family of alums and as a star athlete, John had the recognition to make calls even to folks he hadn't seen in years. Before we knew it - the ball was rolling!



To a St. Gregory Elementary student in the 60's, becoming a Greyhound was a very big deal. **Jerry Ritt '59** and **Mike Manning '61** returned to coach grade school teams - theirs was the proving ground for future athletes. John was an 8th grader during the '67 championship season. The experience of such excitement and acclaim was a powerful incentive to step up and reach for his personal best. Coach's rules of play had far broader application than simply the game of basketball. Coach taught life lessons encompassing fairness, self-esteem, teamwork, respect, leadership, focus, trust, responsibility and determination. Over and over alumni share stories that illustrate this truth and how those lessons have come to bear in their lives far beyond graduation. It's no surprise then that John returned to his alma mater and worked with such commitment to establish the golf outing that now carries his name.

Ken Lydecker '67 was named "Athlete of the Year" in 1967 after scoring the league record of 66 points in one game! Ken was formidable on the court and a hero to 8th graders impatiently waiting their turn. He returned to SGHS after re-connecting at the golf outing then stepped up to volunteer for the Wall of Fame. He is also our newest Board member.

John's death stunned the broad family of SGHS. The impulse to continue the two-year old benefit in John's memory was strong but without a golfer at the helm it easily could have disappeared. Without hesitation, two leaders volunteered to take over as co-chairs: Ken Lydecker '67 and Mike Pope '61. They became, along with Mike McNulty (John's coaching buddy from Arlington Heights) and Joe Stark '59, the power behind the success of Socha/Stark Golf.

Ken is also the force behind his own golf benefit. **To the Troops with Love** began in 2005 as an effort to ease the loneliness and isolation of troops fighting in Iraq. Proceeds are used to create care packages that include DVD players, iPods, CD's, games, phone cards etc. To date \$80,000 in care packages has been sent to individual soldiers on the front lines. Ken recognized an area of unfilled need and, doing something he loved, stepped up to make a difference.



Jerry Rhea '73: The anguish of losing a child to cancer is nearly unspeakable. It is often out of the darkest experience however that one somehow finds the courage to go on and work with dedication towards effecting change. Jerry and wife Karen lost their fourteen year old daughter Kailyn to a rare pediatric cancer. Catalyzed by Kailyn's struggle Jerry was determined to make a difference. Two years ago he began his own golf benefit in support of the pediatric cancer foundation, **Bear Necessities**. The two events raised \$30,000. The outpouring of response brought 144 golfers to play and later to the Rhea home where Jerry and Karen hosted post-game barbecues in their own back yard!



Jerry returned to SGHS after college to help Bernie during the 79/80 season. He's stayed in touch with 70's alums and has played the Socha/Stark event since the start. He shares that, *"ironically we had one golf tournament a year at SGHS and I recall John being a captain of that team. 35 years later golf brings us all back together again."*

In tribute to a life well lived we asked her cousin, **Carol Ingraffia '69,** to share some thoughts: "Gloria not only graduated in 1969, she was Alumni Coordinator from '82 to '94. She was easy to remember with an outgoing personality and face full of freckles. Her greatest strength though wasn't that she was easy to remember but that she remembered you! I envied her openness.



After graduation, Gloria worked at Continental Bank and Superior Coffee but was thrilled when after some volunteering, Sr. Mary Cornille hired her. It felt like old home week when Mr. Bearden became Principal; Gloria had been in his first homeroom in 1965. Gloria's daughter Jennifer graduated SGHS in '93. Husband Al assisted with girls' basketball; even Gloria's Mom, Agnes was a volunteer. Gloria loved working with alums! She so enjoyed reunions and alumni stories. She took photos for the newsletter - she was the '69 yearbook photographer after all!

After leaving Greg's, Gloria joined the Development Office at Swedish Covenant where she worked for ten years. She resigned in '06 due to poor health. In September she was rushed to Swedish with severe complications from the diabetes that had plagued her most of her adult life. She died on November 26. The time in between was filled with daily updates, prayers, hopes, unanswered questions, anger and tears. It was also filled with good memories; so many of them from SGHS. We miss her!"

A New Saint for St. Gregory High School? *

Jerry and Gwen Billings Coniker, Class of 1957, lived a life of extraordinary ministry. They founded the Apostolate for Family Consecration in Ohio that includes Catholic Familyland, a 950 acre conference/ retreat center for family recreation and Eucharistic devotion. Their ministry also created the Familyland TV Network and teaching centers in Mexico, Europe, Russia, Nigeria and the Philippines. In 1999 Pope John Paul appointed the Conikers to his "Pontifical Council for the Family" of only 20 couples who advise Vatican officials. Before moving to Ohio, the Coniker family lived in Fatima for two years in prayerful reflection as preparation for their work. They were parents of 12 children.

Gwen Coniker died in June 2002. After the specified five year waiting period an investigation began in September '07 into whether Gwen exhibited the "heroic virtue" the church requires of a saint. For six months witnesses will be interviewed and everything ever written by or about her will be examined. She will then become known as "Servant of God Gwen Coniker." Reports will then be sent to Rome for scrutiny by theologians and ultimately, the Pope who will decide if she was holy enough to proceed. If so, those promoting her cause will seek evidence of a medical miracle. If authenticated by the Vatican, she will be beatified. One more miracle would be required for sainthood.

"There's nothing wrong with a man believing that his wife is a saint and seeking recognition for that," said Rev. James Martin, a NY Jesuit and author of My Life with the Saints. "Mrs. Coniker would fill a gaping need for a saint with a healthy marriage. Rome is seeking such saints. In the not too distant past theology was such that a priest, brother or sister was seen as holier than a lay person. Most married saints either became celibate in later life or were virtuous despite a bad marriage. One married couple, canonized in 2001, lived for 26 years as brother and sister which shows the church's past problem with sexuality. I think it's great that the church is looking for people like this."
